"For unto us a child is born, unto us a child is given..." Isaiah 9:6

"As short as the time from spark to flame, so brief may the distance be between heart and being." John O'Donohue

From Old Testament prophets to modern day mystics, we stand in awe of a God who humbly joins us from a stable and confidently overcomes the grave. One of the joys of Christmas is in discovering our commonalities with one another. Hymns and carols, cookies and treats; gifts and cards, dinners and banquets. While we all celebrate in our own way, there are things that we do that connect us to both the Christ child and to each other.

Christmas time seems to be the time when we become more aware of distances between us, be it miles, time, or philosophies. While we might not be as distant from the stable as Isaiah was, the distance in relationships in our lives can remove us from the sacredness of this holy time. We might be able to see the lights and hear the bells, but we do not feel the depth of awe that Christ calls us to in our relationships with both the Divine and each other.

If we look to Mary's journey from the beginning, the visit by the angel Gabriel, to the birth of Christ, we know that this wasn't an instantaneous happening. Mary had to accept, explain, journey, arrive, and give birth. If we approach healing the distance in our relationships like Mary's approach to her role in bringing our Divine to life, we see that it is not instantaneous. It is more like a fire that goes from spark to flame, flame to light, light to heat, heat to warmth. Stepping into healing a relationship is that first small spark. From there the Divine walks with us, lighting our way through our hope for completion.

Mary's acceptance of the Holy Spirit's invitation to carry the Divine begins her journey. She then needed to enter into detailed and difficult conversations with family, explaining her part. She then journeys to the place where the new life of God will appear, reminding us that moving to new and different places in both thought and deed takes effort. Mary's arrival takes an unexpected turn when there appears to be no where to turn, and yet through faith she is given safe harbor. Conversations and efforts take unexpected turns, reconsiderations, and different angels to make progress. Finally, new life is brought forth. For Mary, it is the Christ child; for us it a new way to go forward with a relationship that has been healed.

The connection between heart and being is sacred, and it often takes more time to travel that connective journey than bringing a spark to a flame. Time that we are blessed with by the very Spirit who sent Gabriel to Mary and the Word to Isaiah. May this Christmas season be a time for all of us to accept God's call to repairing relationships and birthing new connections through the sacredness of the fire of hope.

Red Lodge Community Church – Special Church Council Meeting, October 20, 2022 Rough Draft of Minutes

In Attendance: Bill Cords (Moderator), Lori Floyd (Secretary), Mark Schubert (Treasurer), Martha Brown, Bill Cords, Libby Gardner, Lori Floyd, Helen Mackay, Jay West, Pastor Pam Peterson; Zoom attendee, Julia Childs.

The duly noticed special meeting opened with quorum declared by Moderator Bill Cords followed by the opening prayer by Pastor Pam Peterson.

The Agenda was presented reviewed and accepted

Agenda Item # 1: We have received request by the Red Lodge Area Community Foundation (RLACF) to house a team of nine Americorps NCCC members for the week of Nov 11-17, 2022 while they are in town to work on Habitat For Humanity homes. Sleeping quarters will be the Fellowship Hall for the men and the Brother Van Room for the women (or vice versa depending on numbers). They will use the shower and kitchen facilities. The Preschool is fine with this. Motion by Libby Gardner, duly seconded and approved.

Agenda Item # 2: This was a proposal to appoint an additional member to the Pastor Parish Relations committee. After brief discussion, Duane Estelle was nominated for 2 year term by Libby Gardner. The motion was duly seconded and approved.

Agenda Item # 3: The main business of the meeting was discussing and framing the 2023 Budget to be presented for the Congregation's approval or disapproval at the fall annual meeting to be held on November 20, 2022. There was wide ranging discussion of many items, considerations and details on the line items of projected income and expenses.

The flood damage and recovery were discussed at length because of the potential affects on funds available for the coming year. With details and clarifications from Treasurer Mark Schubert and Jay West (Facilities Management Committee), we considered the current expenses, contributions and potential reimbursements from the Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA) grants. The FEMA reimbursement application has been submitted by the local agency representatives and it now at the second level of agency review. Mark and Jay clarified expectations for if and how much the FEMA grant may be. We are close to completing full restoration having close to 900 hours of volunteer time, about \$60,000 in out-of-pocket expenses, and about \$20,000 in dontations. FEMA representatives inspected our church and recovery work in September when we were (in their view) roughly halfway through the recovery work. Their team valued our project at \$128,000. The FEMA program for houses of worship can reimburse about 75% of the estimated project value. Mark and Jay cautioned that there are additional levels of agency review before reimbursement

will be paid. Because of the very large number of volunteer hours (which are counted as matching funds), there is a possibility of the FEMA formula yielding more to us than just our direct project out-of-pocket expenses, especially considering the roughly \$20,000 in flood-repair funds the Church has received by private and UCC donations. That possibility led to discussion of what we might do with any FEMA money including proposals for donating some portion of the money to others in the county who are much further from receiving flood relief. The conclusion of the discussion was that the proposals are premature until we see how much we actually receive and also see the outcome of this fall's Pledge Drive.

We then had lengthy discussion of the draft Budget's line items of for projected income in 2023. We recognized that the target for Account 7100 (Contributions) is \$200,000, it would be more appropriate for the budget to be presented at the annual meeting with the conservative assumption that contributions will total \$156,5000 based on what we been seeing in the recent difficult times. We also considered that use fees will have to be increased but do not yet have an estimate of what that might bring in. We decided that "Reimbursed Budgeted Expense" (Item 7319) may be less than last year and probably ought to be estimated at \$1000 for the coming year.

We then turned to a discussion Administration expenses. On motion by Helen Mackay, duly seconded and approved, we decided to budget the salary for our much valued Administrative Coordinator at \$30,000. We considered a variety of possible adjustments to supplies, service contract costs (such that for services by Arina Baranko, whose business does the weekly cleaning and custodial services), but will assume our Interent Tech and Computer/Copier expenses will be the same as this year. Briefly reviewing the various committees' budgets, we concluded that most of those items are relatively fixed amounts. A question about item 8158, child care expenses could not be answered and it may be appropriate to delete that \$1900 item.

It was moved, duly seconded and adopted that we be presented with a revised budget for consideration at the next regular council meeting on November 10 so that we can be ready to present a proposed budget at the Fall Annual Meeting. We recognized that, as for the past few years, this will be a deficit budget.

The remaining budget questions concerned what to present on the pastor's compensation package for 2023. Pastor Pam recused herself from the meeting at this point. The Moderator then reconvened us in executive session of the Council to consider examine the pastor's compensation package which comprises the largest items. Discussion took place. There was discussion about the pastor not having had a cost of living adjustment (COLA) in 3 years, the current economic inflation, salaries elsewhere in the UCC, and this Church's stuggling financial condition. It was moved, seconded and approved to leave this open for further discussion but suggest offering a 5% increase in salary (which also will increase the annual annuity compensation) for 2023. In the meantime, a committee will be formed to do a performance review which also has not been done for three years.

The business of the day having been concluded, the meeting was adjourned at 8:30 p.m.

We have so many "Irma's" in our congregation now that I cannot list all of you but know that each of you is appreciated. As our congregation numbers are shrinking, it seems we are called upon more and more. Our church's budget is certainly not where we want it. Our Council worked many hours trying to get things as close to what and where our church needs may be in the coming year. We have faith that the work of our church will continue on the right path.

Why does God call us to serve others? Simply put, we are made that way. God designed us for charity. Jesus showed us how to serve others with charity every day of our lives. Doing good is in our nature. It is part of our purpose and it is how we live our faith.

Notes on our Church's History.

We've been talking about the flood and flood recovery work for the last six issues. That work is now complete enough for the Church to rededicate the downstairs and to resume events which we were suspended for several years because of the Covid pandemic.

The Fellowship Hall was formally rededicated on October 30 when we held coffee hour downstairs for the first time in six months. The left hand photo shows the Hall shortly before we came downstairs after service and the photo on the right shows us

On the following Saturday (November 5), we held the first Harvest Dinner since 2019. The Church has been having the Harvest Dinner since at least the 1970s and held it for many years after service on the first Sunday in November. Because that

resulted in low attendance at services both because so many of us were downstairs working in the kitchen and because the date was the Sunday of the time-change from daylight savings time, many felt bleary eyed, too. Holding the event on Saturday avoided those problems and also helped with assembling a crew of volunteers including community members. Here are a few snapshots taken during the event (there are more on our website.)









While our town's first "real" snowfalls started during Harvest Dinner, it wasn't until the following Sunday, November 13, that we were able to host the town's "First Snowfall Banana Split Ice Cream Sundae Party." This community event was started by Martha Young in the 1980s to celebrate the first autumn snowfall, signaling the end of summery weather and the beginning of our wintery season. Initially, Martha and a few friends went out for ice cream sundaes. The year the ice cream parlor closed, the event moved to Martha's house and was held on the evening of the day on which there was enough snow to

cover Martha's front lawn past 11 am. (Guynema Terry and John Clayton can tell you about holding the event there even when Martha happened to be out of town.) The event moved to the Regis Café after Martha opened it in 2003. The event moved to the Community Church in 2017, after Martha sold Regis. The event usually has been held in mid-September or early October, and we had the ice cream on hand in early October. (Thanks to LuAnn Brown.) However, this year's "real" snows started late, during Harvest Dinner. Significant snow fell during the following week but we all were so busy (with elections on Tuesday and many other things going on) that it was Sunday afternoon (November 13) before we were able to hold the event, from 3pm to 6pm. 



"I tell you, My Father in heaven does not want one of these little children to be lost."-Jesus (Matt. 18:14)


