"Your word is a lamp to my feet and a light to my path." Psalm 119: 105 NRSVUE

Have you ever picked a "word" for the year? A word that you use as a guide, inspiration, or theme? A word that stays with you all year long, appearing in unexpected places and giving you direction when you wondered which way to go? I've been doing this for many years and have picked words like "joy" "hope" "truth" and "faith." In 2021 my word was "pursue" and last year my word was once again "hope." For 2023 the word that will guide my way is "embrace

How does one pick a "word" for their year? I take a block of time and sit in meditation, asking the Divine what my word for the year will be. I listen to my heart and wonder what the year will bring, and I try a few different words on for size. This year the words that came to me were "laughter" "peace" "joy" and "pestilence." Ok, so I threw out pestilence right off the top since my hashtag (as recommended by Lynell) will be #nopestilance for 2023!

"Embrace" fits in so many ways, and I am excited to write it in my monthly planner, on post-it notes and on my heart. God's Word comes to me with that same embracing excitement. Daily meditations on a specific (although randomly selected) Bible verse lights my daily path. This year I will be using a new lectionary for our worship called, "The Women's Lectionary," written by my Old Testament professor, Rev. Dr. Wilda Gafney. The scriptures are selected from various translations and the order of the lectionary steps away from the traditional readings and leans into the feminine Divine, highlighting the often-missed women of the Bible. Beginning January 10 our Noon Brown Bag Bible Study will focus on the scriptures selected for the following Sunday with a concentration on how the translations differ from what we would typically use from the Revised Common Lectionary, which for our church has been the New Standard Revised Version Updated Edition.

I invite you to sit with some stillness over the next few days to see what "word" God lays on your heart for 2023. During worship on January 1, we will share our "words" during the sermon, offering them up to God as we move forward into the new year. You will be amazed at how your "word" appears to you throughout the year. You might see it on a creatively decorated sign in one of our local shops. You will pick it out of the headlines, and it will appear in your daily devotions at the exact time when you need it the most. Embrace with me, won't you, what your "word" for 2023?

Being Gifted

"Tell me your story; I've got time and want to hear."
These might be the most precious words a person can say to another person, other than "I love you."
In my experiences, it has happened between strangers catching up to each other on the el
Camino de Santiago pilgrimage, as well as between two people who have just met as they sit next to each other on a train or plane. It is also what happens in the best search committee interviews

when a church is looking for a new pastor. Sometimes it takes more relational energy than it should, to do this with our closest acquaintances. Offering the best of ourselves by taking time to listen to someone is a gift that gives back relationship.

News from the Lawrence Livermore National Laboratory this week heralded the scientific achievement of this same dynamic of getting out more than was put it in. A nuclear fusion test for the first time produced more energy than the laser used to create it. Listening to another person can create more relationship than what it takes to get a conversation started. While I don't claim a tritium isotope's amount of understanding about nuclear fusion, and at times wonder if I have any more understanding about human relationships, I do know that making time is key. Nuclear fusion calls it "confinement time" and for relationships it might best be called "gift time." Occasionally, some confinement times, like a snow day, can be a gift time for our relationships.

I see a lot of activity this Advent season in preparation for Christmas. While I was in Atlanta for a meeting last week at a convention hotel across from a significant shopping mall I saw a constant traffic jam in and out of the area's parking lots. It seemed everyone was getting out. The CoVid pandemic did confine us in many ways and also showed us how to slow down. Perhaps the gift-shopping of this season reflects the deep appreciation we have gained for people who have become all the more important to us over the past few years. For all we are moved to give in appreciation, may we find even more ways to give time to listen.
