"In the bulb there is a flower, in the seed an apple tree"... the familiar words to a springtime tune that we are singing this time of year... the lyrics continue.. in cocoons a hidden promise... I like that verse the best. The hidden promise of the cocoon. The caterpillar has transitioned into the cocoon and that is where the work of creating the beautiful butterfly takes place. The work of transition; from one stage to the next with the hope of what the end product will look like.

And we know that we are never the end product, are we? In our faith journeys we are constantly going back into the cocoon to allow the Spirit to do more work; to challenge ourselves to do more work. I often wonder what the "self-talk" conversations sound like inside those cocoons! I love to listen to my 2 ½ year old grand-daughter, Kora, talk to herself. In her own little world, toddling around the park, having a wonderful conversation with herself. I can understand most of what she is saying, and it isn't unusual to hear her say, "I got it!" I'm pretty sure that if we could hear the conversation from inside a cocoon, we would hear that exact statement. "I got it!"

We "get it" from the work of the Holy Spirit. From years of prayer, meditation, conversation, studying the Word, and listening to sermons. The hymn continues, "From the past will come the future, what it holds... a mystery." And to that lyric I add, "We can't get there by doing everything the same." If the caterpillar wove the cocoon and just stopped there...locked inside its silky cage... it would never become the butterfly. Once inside the cocoon, the caterpillar does not stop in its sameness. It does even more work. Now, I am not a lepidopterist. However, I am pretty sure that at some point that caterpillar is saying, "I got it!"

I like to think of our sanctuary as our cocoon. We arrive on a Sunday morning worn out from the journey of the week. We crawl into our pew and take a big breath, letting out a sigh of relief. And then... the work begins. We pray. We meditate. We have a conversations. We read the Word. We listen to a sermon. And then... the transformation begins. Hopefully, when we walk out into the bright sunlight of the spring day we say, "I got it!" And... every Sunday is different. The prayers are different, the conversations are different, the Word is different and ... I certainly hope... the sermon is different. How else could I possibly hope to create change in our lives if I did the same thing every single Sunday? How could you possibly hope to be the change in the world that you hope to see if you did not do things differently... every single day?

You are going to hear me say this phrase A LOT in the coming year... "We cannot do things the same over and over again and expect different results." It simply does not work. No two butterflies are identical... because the caterpillars do not do the same work in the cocoon over and over. Something is different. If we want different results in our lives, in our community, and in our world... we need to do things differently. And then we can all shout in unison, "We got it!"




On Sunday, April 25, I preached my sermons on the reasons that I am no longer using the traditional words of the Lord's Prayer in worship services that I plan. Following is the sections of the content of the letter from Pastor Bret Myers, who serves a UCC church in Waterloo, IA that I quoted. As I said in my sermons, I chose to quote Pastor Bret rather than try to re-word what he said because, quite simply, he said so well. I welcome conversation and comments.

From Pastor Bret Myers:

"I used the "traditional" version (which, of course, is not Jesus' words as he did not speak English), without thought of how it affected those who saw it as exclusive and hierarchical... I have come to see that the all-male language of the "traditional" version (e.g., God referred to as 'Father'), along with the hierarchical language (e.g., kingdom, debts, etc.), subtly affirms and devalues certain groups of our society while also perpetuating inequalities between them...Jesus wanted an egalitarian society where all were to be treated as equals in worth and dignity. When God is regarded as male, when kingdoms rather than communities of equality are included in our prayers, and when debts are things to be "forgiven" (obviously by those who have more assets towards others who have few assets) rather than the elimination of debt completely as the Biblical idea of Jubilee expresses, then we subconsciously uphold the very injustices that we are supposed to be trying to eliminate in following Jesus' ways...But the question for me now is whether we are comforting some at the expense of violating the dignity of others who have been traditionally oppressed in our culture... I feel compelled by ethical duty to do what I think is right given my limited understanding. I will try to err on the side of justice for all and inclusion rather err on the side of privilege for some and exclusion... Discrimination and systemic injustice are pervasive in our society, and most "good" people are unaware of how it has infiltrated nearly every aspect of our society -- including the way we see our relationship to God and others within our places of religious fellowship...Part of changing our society for the better requires us to change our language for the better. As we come to value a more equitable and egalitarian world, so too must our language change to reflect that different set of values. Otherwise we are simply sabotaging our own efforts with the language that we use...Whether everyone agrees with me or not, I have to try to set an example of inclusion that is premised on the equal worth and dignity of every person regardless of their sexuality, socio-economic condition, ethnicity, or any other factor in which our culture is remiss in making distinctions of who is more valuable than others...Our loyalty to Jesus needs to supersede our loyalty to culture; and our duty to equity needs to exceed our assuagement of those who may be unfairly comfortable with tradition."

MOMENT FROM THE MODERATOR

I tend to be guided by four cardinal virtues -- Temperance, Fortitude, Prudence, and Justice. Perhaps, for a church such as ours that is facing a reopening and uncertain direction, "prudence" is a virtue worthy of our consideration. Just how do we define prudence? Three definitions follow:



Prudence is care, caution, and good judgment, as well as wisdom in looking ahead.

Prudence is care and good sense that someone shows when making a decision or taking action.

Prudence implies caution in deliberating and consulting on the most suitable means to accomplish valuable purposes.

From these definitions, I identify three key ingredients: Good judgment, care and good sense, and caution in deliberating. Incorporating these three ideas in all future deliberations should result in successful actions and decisions. Others have offered the following thoughts concerning prudence.

Prudence is foresight and far-sightedness. It's the ability to make immediate decisions on the basis of their longer-range effects. -- *John Ortberg*

Prudence does not mean failing to accept responsibilities and postponing decisions; it means being committed to making joint decisions after pondering responsibly the road to be taken. --Pope Benedict XVI

The limits of prudence: one cannot jump out of a burning building gradually. -- Mason Cooley

Prudence supposes the value of the end to be assumed and refers only to the adaptation of the means. It is the relation of right means for given ends. -- William Whewell

Prudence and compromise are necessary means, but every man should have an impudent end which he will not compromise. -- *Charles Horton Cooley*
