RLCC Council Meeting 1-8-19

The meeting was called to order and opened with prayer by Moderator, Debbie Awes. Those in attendance were Debbie Awes, Skip Bratton, Dixie McCampbell, Linda Hanson, Debbie Tomicich, Shirley Quinn, Donna Ritter, and Renee Gabrian.

Minutes of the previous meeting were reviewed. Dixie moved the minutes be corrected to read proposed memorial funds should be moved to Finance for the recommendation on disbursement, Debbie Tomicich seconded and the motion carried.

<u>Facilities</u>: Skip informed the new rugs have been purchased and put in place for a monthly savings of \$40.00. Projects they are working on include shelving in the media room, kitchen ceiling patching, bulletin board strips in Pastor Pam's office, new GFI outlet in kitchen, toilet paper holder repair in downstairs women's restroom, flood lights set for daylight saving time, and thermostat settings adjustments. Keyless entry access to the church is being discussed with concerns of unlimited access, potential vandalism with resultant insurance cost increases. Alternatives to keyless entry would be additional keys given to Ministry Chairpersons and/or a lockbox. They will also be researching security cameras on church entries. Wood for the Memorial Plaque has been obtained and will be built by Wally and Skip.

<u>Stewardship and Mission</u>: Linda reports there is no formal meeting in January, they will resume work on the Church Directory, and will be meeting again in February.

<u>Financial Secretary</u>: Debbie reported pledges have come in nicely and year end statements will be sent out next week. The Christmas Fund collected \$1152,00.

Treasurer: Shirley reports 2018 expenses of \$156,368.66 with budgeted amount of \$168,843.00.

Moderator: Debbie reported the Annual Meeting will be January 20, 2019 with budget presentation.

<u>Vice Moderator</u>: Donna will be available January 13, 2019 to open church for services in Pastor Pam's absence.

<u>Diaconate</u>: Renee reported Christmas Eve services had over 180 in attendance. Several concerns regarding communion are being reviewed including gluten-free procedure, ushers, additional chalices. Name tags and greeter lists will be addressed when the Church Directory is finished. Christmas undecorating of the church will occur January 13 after services. The creche sustained wind damage and repair will be assessed. Dixie notified the Carbon County News contains incorrect Adult and Sunday School times. Debbie Tomicich will contact the paper.

<u>Finance</u>: Dixie reported the office computer is over 10 years old and needing replaced. Dixie moved Jay West be allowed to purchase a new computer, Shirley seconded, and motion carried. Debbie Awes will notify Jay to purchase the office computer replacement.

Old Business: None

New Business: None. The next meeting will be February 12, 2019. There being no further business, the meeting was adjourned.

Readers help Mexican missionaries

"In the February issue of *Rural Montana*, we introduced you to the work done by missionaries Eladio and Margarita Lopez in San Luis, Mexico, at the request of NorVal Electric Cooperative Trustee Rocky Kittleson.

Kittleson, who traveled to Mexico this year and in 2017 as part of a church mission trip, told readers how the Lopez family was trying to help children who literally lived in the city dump. To do so, they needed \$5,000 to pay for power to be run to a flower shop and deli. Sales from the shop would fund various outreach efforts and help build an orphanage or women's shelter.

Montana's electric co-op members and *RM* readers from across the country answered the call better than Kittleson and the Lopezes could have ever imagined—more than \$12,000 was raised in just a few weeks."

It calls for the better angels among and within us to always resist impulses to hate, to condemn, to vilify, or to castigate. In such a time as this, the United Church of Christ's call to fulfill the prayer of Jesus, that they may all be one, stands as an urgent mandate to disciples who envision a just world for all.

As an ordained minister, Fred Rogers harnessed the power of television to tell children they were loved—and to show them how to love others. In *You Are Special*, he writes, "When we love a person, we accept him or her exactly as is: the lovely with the unlovely, the strong along with the fearful, the true mixed in with the façade, and of course, the only way we can do it is by accepting ourselves that way."



In a review of the touching documentary *Won't You Be My Neighbor?* a writer for *Variety* notes: "Rogers' real secret was ... that the call to love your neighbor as yourself isn't a slogan to hang in your kitchen with flowers around it—it's a decision you make at every moment, to view every man, woman, and child on earth as your neighbor. If you don't see and feel that, and act on it, then you're just another narcissist with a kitchen slogan."

Last October, when a synagogue shooting shattered the peace of Rogers' real-life former neighborhood, residents of all religions embraced one another as neighbors. Afterward, the Fred Rogers Center stated, "We long for a day when there is no more tragedy born from hatred."
